Subject: 2015 Rural Advisory Committee Report Card

Summary Of The Discussion Item:

The Rural Advisory Committee (RAC) exists to provide consultative leadership and advice to staff and Council on matters of rural interest, as it relates to residential, agricultural and Council matters. Additionally, the committee represents Kingston’s rural residents. In 2015, RAC accomplished many initiatives while serving as a forum for public discussion and examination of issues of interest or impact to the rural community; specifically, RAC hosted a large renewable energy public meeting in August 2015 and advised Council on what applications should receive a municipal resolution.

2015 marks the end of the fourth full year of operation of this committee. Over the past year the committee held six meetings (February, March, May, June, August and October).

In May 2015 a work plan was presented to the Rural Advisory Committee outlining the priorities identified by members. The work plan is regularly updated to reflect additional priorities for the Council term. The Rural Advisory Committee identified the following areas of interest in their committee work plan as integral for success:

The Committee has completed seven (7) items on its work plan in 2015, and will continue to pursue the goals and projects of the work plan in 2016.

Mandate Considerations:

The Rural Advisory Committee pursued consultation, demonstrated leadership and served as an avenue of communication between the City of Kingston and the rural community.

The mandate of this committee is to represent the interests of Kingston’s rural residents, as they relate to residential, agricultural and rural-business matters, specifically:

1. To serve as a forum for public discussion to examine issues of interest or impact to the rural community, including but not limited to:
 - a. municipal services/infrastructure
 - b. use of private and/or public land
 - c. environmental issues
 - d. socio-economic matters
 - e. wildlife management
 - f. transportation and utility corridors
 - g. snowmobile and ATV use
 - h. hunting and firearms
 - i. trails and private property
 - j. emergency services, access to health and social services and service delivery in rural areas
 - k. proposed or existing federal or provincial legislation, policies and programs

2. To provide input and advice as required , through Council or a standing committee of Council on issues of interest or impact to the rural community, including but not limited to:
 - a. municipal studies, plans, by-laws and proposed projects that may have a potential rural implication
 - b. development of policies and programs
 - c. municipal economic strategies
 - d. implementation of federal and provincial legislation and programs
 - e. potential funding opportunities

- f. strategies to improve the delivery of municipal services, programs and information and ways in which these strategies can meet the needs of rural residents
- g. rural land stewardship programs or proposed projects of the city, community groups or other agencies

(By-law Number 2010-205; 2011-64)

3. Review and recommend appropriate means and methods of communication, including information sessions, public meetings or other to communicate City information to rural residents and promote two-way communication between rural residents and the city.

Discussion:

In 2015, the committee was involved in a number of key initiatives. This began with receiving information on planning applications that were identified as having significant public interest in the rural area. That was followed by a rural parks update which prompted the committee to pass a motion that the City could examine portions of open space that are not environmentally protected areas to ensure they are properly maintained. The committee also received information on the estate residential review and advised staff on hamlet designation and lot severances.

In 2015, the committee was a conduit for receiving public input regarding proposed solar projects from 3 proponents, prior to hosting a public meeting. Delegations were also heard regarding Aragon Road; brush back on rural roads; and issues of rezoning Bylaws and applications for changes to the Official Plan. The committee heard several delegations and received several items of correspondence which aided committee members in advising staff on these areas of concern and creating real change to help rural residents.

The committee learned about rural parks maintenance, ensured that signage for hamlets, Highway 15, historic names, and signage to create more awareness about agricultural areas were installed. The committee also advocated for the Secondary Suites Program – Kingston East Area Expansion, stating that there is a demand for secondary suites in the rural area.

The Rural Advisory Committee aided staff and Council with the Municipal Process for Large Renewable Procurement (LRP) applications. The committee identified that receiving information and providing input and advice prior to Council consideration of large ground mounted solar energy project applications was monumental in ensuring community concerns were addressed. This led to the committee hosting a public meeting as part of the Large Renewable Procurement Process (LRP); residents were invited to attend the Rural Advisory Committee Meeting on August 20, 2015, to review the large renewable procurement applications in the City of Kingston.

The Rural Advisory Committee had approximately 125 residents attend the large renewable public meeting. All proponents presented their applications and were held accountable to the public through the rural advisory committee's questions. The public meeting was an opportunity for residents to have their voice heard, view presentations from the renewable energy

proponents, ask questions, and provide feedback on each specific application. The process was successful and aided Council with the municipal resolutions.

The year ended with the committee receiving a Five Year Update to the Official Plan (OP) – Proposed Rural Area Changes report from staff. The committee highlighted local food policies language, the importance of encouraging rural business and advised that the definition of clustering in the OP needs to be updated. RAC also received an update on the Waterfront Master Plan and provided feedback on Grass Creek Park, identified opportunities with developing the trail network and having more connectivity in the rural waterfront.

The Rural Advisory Committee looks forward to continuing with the projects identified in the committee's work plan and furthering its role as a conduit for positive change and resident input into matters that impact the quality of life of Kingston's rural residents.

Recommendation:

That the 2015 Rural Advisory Committee Report Card be approved as a summary of the work accomplished by the Rural Advisory Committee; and

That the Report Card be a reflection of the engaged rural community in Kingston, the efforts of motivated City staff, and the support of elected officials who appreciate the value and impact of rural residents.
